I taught at a private school for Jewish boys and the families persuaded me to go to Israel and work on a kibbutz. Israel was a very different country in the late 1960's. As I was a farmer's daughter, I drove tractors while others weeded cotton and worked in the kitchen.

I also spent a year in South Africa working at a school for deaf children in Durban. Although I loved the work, I couldn't cope with the apartheid regime and came home to my family.

After my parents' deaths, I made their beautiful home called 'Westella', into an art gallery. With two little boys, this all became too hard, and we moved to Launceston where I was principal of a school for young children with special needs in Kings Meadows.

Retirement is great. I live at Beauty Point by the Tamar River where I garden and read books. I have a street library, am involved with the church and the Garden Club. I'm on the TVU3A committee, and of course, I love the U3A History class held at Low Head.

traversed, spring flowers, fauna, accommodation and food.









CLASSICAL MUSIC APRECIATION:

We are privileged to have a Classical Music Appreciation short course with world renowned conductor, music education consultant and trombonist, Mr. Monte Mumford held at the Windsor Precinct, Area 2. This course filled very quickly, but members are always encouraged to put their names on the Wizard waiting lists.



We currently have 17 courses on offer. Others were scheduled but were cancelled due to lack of support, To find a new tutor is difficult and then to have to cancel – such a pity.



UKE YAK

Not only does U3A present us with interests to fill our brains and hearts with new experiences and friendships, but the classes can sometimes be a springboard to pursue chosen subjects in depth. **Bob Jenks** enthusiastically leads an ever-growing band of Tamar Valley ukulele players and generously passes on details of other opportunities when they arise.

Recently, two players, **Lisa and Libby** signed on for one of these, a weekend workshop organised by **Jackie Barnes** with talented instructor **Sally Carter** which they both described as fantastic. The cost was \$210 and included all sheet music resources in a lovely



binder book, and morning and afternoon tea with the main focus on learning new chords and chord progressions. Also there was a focus on TAB and learning 3 to 4 different parts that can be combined into ensemble. All 13 songs were arranged by Sally. There were sessions on performance with focus on "counting in" and how to find your starting note when singing. She also gave tips on how to use a plectrum, playing the same chords in different shapes up and down the fret-board, and how to easily transpose any song into another key.








EVENTS FOR 2026:
